

# **Royal Garden Party**

Sarah Barley, our Trust Director of Employability was invited to Buckingham Palace after being nominated via the DfE for her "Service to Education". Sarah has spent the last 8 years creating employability skills development programmes to allow students to experience a variety of industries and professions before they even begin an application. The Employer-Led Programme and Pre-Teacher Training Experience allows anyone thinking about a career within industry or teaching to explore a range of application routes and develop a set of standout skills for application and interview.

Since launch in 2017, 175 students have enrolled on the Employer Led Programme which enables students to take part in a full employability skills development programme with Inspire Ignite, take part in industry mentoring sessions with local employers and apply for work experience opportunities.



In 2020, Sarah launched the country's first Virtual Pre-Teacher Training Work Experience Programme for school, college and university students who were thinking about joining the profession. The online programme allows people to develop a teaching resource for Kingston Jr Academy in Kenya to support creative teaching and provide resources to local teachers. Since 2020, over 400 enrolments have taken place and the programme now features on the Get into Teaching website to support recruitment nationally. Sarah has also developed the UK's only Apprenticeship Preparation Programme. The programme enables those looking for an apprenticeship to engage in a structured calendar of events and activities to help support their application. This programme has won the Apprenticeship Champion of The Year Award via the government's National Apprenticeship Service.

Sarah spent the day meeting the royal family, listening to the bands play and enjoyed afternoon tea on the palace lawn. Sarah would also like to thank all of the staff who she works with every day because without their support, none of the work that she has been able to carry out would have been possible. It is a real team effort here at TeamTEAL!

# Spotlight on Luc Perquin, Director of Estates

Luc was born and raised in the Netherlands, where he was once told by his year 2 teacher that he would never pass his English exams. Funnily enough he passed and has ended up in the UK, and even claims his English is now better than his Dutch!

Luc's parents were both teachers and although Luc used to often help read to the children they taught, he took an alternative career path and studied business management in Rotterdam and fashion in The Hague. His first work placement was working in a high-end men's fashion store, where he used to sell Burberry and Hugo Boss suits. He was soon offered a permanent position as a full-time sales assistant, before eventually being promoted to store manager. Luc is now able to say what suit size somebody is by simply looking at them!

After working in retail and realising a 9-5 job wasn't for him, Luc started working in a small hotel in Rotterdam, where he did everything from working on the reception, to serving at the bar and cooking in the kitchen



- he claims it was a real life Fawlty Towers. Despite being admittedly unable to fry an egg or pull a pint before working at the hotel, he really enjoyed this line of work and decided to apply for an assistant cruise manager role on a river cruise, sailing through the Netherlands, Germany, and France. He worked on the ship for a year and enjoyed every second. He is now also fluent in German, Dutch, English, Flemish, French and Italian because of it, and even speaks a little Russian.

In 2000, Luc started working for P&O ferries as a storekeeper, where he soon found himself promoted to assistant purser. This is when he met his now wife, who was the entertainments manager on the ship at the time. Because of their different shift patterns and the lack of time spent together off the ships, Luc decided it was time to move to Hull in 2003, where they could have some sort of private life outside of work. Luc then moved back to working in the hotel industry and was often recognised and approached by companies to lead big projects, including the opening of top hotels.

When COVID-19 hit in 2020 and the hotel industry took a hit, Luc applied to work for the COVID testing centres as a mobile testing unit commander. He was trained by the RAF and tested across East and West Yorkshire, soon becoming area manager at the Humber Bridge COVID site. In that role he oversaw 16 COVID testing sites and was responsible for the site managers, health and safety and all facilities management. When Boris Johnson announced that testing would stop on the 1st April that year, Luc knew he would need to look for new work, which is when he joined TEAL in March 2022 as interim Director of Facilities and Estates. He's not looked back since!

Luc says he really enjoys working for TEAL and loves the diversity of the schools and people. He likes that he can physically influence the experience that students have in their schools. Luc believes that if we change things positively, students may not notice this, but these changes can have a significant impact on the environment they are in and experience throughout their time in education.

In his spare time, Luc loves to travel and is a big USA fan. He has big plans for 2024 and is hoping to travel around North America with his family. You could say Luc is TEAL's very own Dr Doolittle as he has 2 dogs, 2 cats and 3 chickens – he did have 24 at one point but this was too noisy for the neighbours! If Luc could do any other job, he says he would love to run a massive hotel somewhere warm like the Maldives.
