Continued Trust Growth

At the start of this academic year, we welcomed Howden Church of England Infant School to TEAL. As Lee Quinn-Hill was already Executive Headteacher at both the Infant and Junior School, it feels as if they have been a part of TeamTEAL for much longer! They were judged by Ofsted to be Good school and following a formal interview process, we are delighted that Lee has been appointed as a full time Executive Headteacher to oversee both schools. We know Lee and his team will continue to lead the school in the TEAL way! It helps that it is only 25 steps from one office to another, as the schools are based on the same site.

Naburn CE Primary School, based in York, joined us on 1 October as a sponsored academy. It is a small village school with currently 44 children on roll. Following an inadequate judgement by Ofsted, the school had a package of support from York City Council and has made great progress. Following reinspection last term (with the inspection team recognising the upward trajectory of the school) it was judged to now be 'requires improvement'.

The Hub School is set to join us this term and the central team are working hard to ensure that the conversion runs smoothly and we will update you once the school has successfully joined TeamTEAL.

As part of our ongoing commitment to making great schools and happier, stronger communities, the central team have also submitted an application to sponsor a Social, Emotional and Mental Health (SEMH) Free School. The school was approved by the DfE in early 2023 and will be situated on the site of the old St Anne's School in Welton, sharing a boundary with South Hunsley School. The application deadline was over the summer break and there was considerable competition from a number of local and national providers. We look forward to hearing if we will be invited to interview for the next stage of the application process.

We were delighted that the class of 2022 were all assessed and awarded QTS by our specially-convened QTS awarding panel; we wish them all well as they embark on the teaching careers. The YWTT class of 2023 is the biggest cohort to date, with over 60 trainees across both the primary and secondary programmes.

Alison and her team are currently preparing for the recruitment window for the class of 2024 which opened in early October, with a number of potential candidates already attending webinars and looking to submit their applications.

Open Events

Thank you to staff from all of our schools who have supported open events for prospective parents and pupils on evenings and Saturdays. We know that these events take a great amount of organising and the feedback we have had from all schools is that these have been very well attended and parental feedback has been very positive.

Vivup Platform

Since launching our partnership with Vivup in March this year, many of you have taken advantage of the range of benefits available to all staff at TEAL. As you know, we have recently partnered with Tusker, enabling staff to apply for a car via the salary sacrifice scheme and have also partnered with Wagestream, which allows you to pay, track and save your money, and advance up to your earned salary each month on demand.



There are also a growing range of benefits you can access, including lifestyle savings, health and wellbeing support, the Cycle to Work Scheme, Bike Purchase Scheme, Home and Electrical Scheme and a range of local benefits (which we are continuing to develop).

We are excited to announce that we now have a Virtual GP service available to all TEAL colleagues, allowing you to access a qualified GP from the comfort of your own home or workplace. The telephone GP service is available 24/7, 365 days per year from anywhere in the world and the video consultation service is available from 8am to 10pm, 7 days per week, all year around (with the exception of Christmas Day).

Estates News

TEAL has an ongoing commitment to improve the quality of the school estate and during the last school year we have invested in several projects across our schools. In North Cave Primary School, we refurbished the KS2 accessible toilet and replaced the carpets in the KS2 classrooms and corridor. In Driffield School, work has started to replace all the remaining single glazed windows in the West Building.

The Trust has also worked to create a more sustainable school estate and will continue to replace all lights in every school to LEDs. Last year Driffield School, Malet Lambert and Howden Junior School were completed. LED replacement work has started at North Cave Primary School and will soon start at Wilberfoss Primary School. The expected remaining spend will be £216,000 over the next two years.

We are also continuing with make our estate a safer place to work. In 2023/2024 we will spend £119,000 across our schools upgrading the fire safety measures. This work will continue for the next 2 years, where we will spend a further £300,000.

Spotlight on Richard McDonald, Assistant Principal

Richard has re-joined TEAL this year as an Assistant Principal after a stint at Holderness Academy, where he was an Assistant Headteacher. In his role, he'll be looking at professional development, looking to develop new ways of sharing CPD and great practice across the trust. You might see Richard out and about in Malet Lambert and Driffield most weeks, since he teaches English across both schools (as well as sitting on the Malet Lambert SLT). His English specialism is also something he's putting to use in his trust role, with an additional focus on exploring how we teach and promote reading across the curriculum.

Richard started his teaching journey as an NQT at South Hunsley, going on to lead the EdTech strategy there before becoming Head of English. He then moved across to Driffield School as Director of English in 2017, leading on whole-school literacy and elements of whole-school CPD in addition to his departmental responsibilities.

A self-confessed 'edu-nerd', Richard enjoys reading the research around what makes effective teaching and using this to inform his practice as both a teacher and a leader. This has also resulted in him presenting at various conferences and writing for the Chartered College of Teaching's Impact journal on multiple occasions. This year, he's been looking at the research on effective leadership as part of his work on a Level 7 Apprenticeship, combined with a Masters in Leadership and Management. After featuring on the Pride & Progress podcast (talking about being an LGBT+ leader), he's also working with that community to organise a conference next year to share good practice on LGBT+ inclusive education.

As a typical English teacher, Richard reads a lot of fiction and poetry outside work and is always keen to discuss what he's reading with colleagues and pupils alike. Richard also loves to perform in musical theatre, having been involved in various productions over the years. Most recently, he's performed with Beverley Musical Theatre as Seymour (in 'Little Shop of Horrors') and Gomez (in 'The Addams Family'). However, perhaps his most memorable performance for Driffield School staff will be his rendition of 'I Will Survive' as part of their 'Pop-Pop Chicken Challenge'.









North Cave CE Primary School

The summer term proved to be an exciting time for the children at North Cave CE Primary School. Alongside our KS2 production of 'The Amazing Adventures of Superstan' and our sports days, we were once again proud to offer every child in the school the opportunity of taking part in a residential visit. The children in Classes 1 and 2 visited Paxwold, Class 3 visited Spires Bank House and Class 4 visited Kingswood.

During the summer term, the children in Year 5 completed their work towards the John Muir Award. This award is an environmental award that encourages awareness and responsibility for the natural environment. As part of their work, the children worked in the school's wildlife area, learning more about the environment there and making some improvements. The children returned to school well in September and we were pleased that our Reception intake was full and that numbers across the school are at their highest level for over ten years! The children have enjoyed taking part in a number of events already this term, including interschool football, our Harvest Festival supporting Hull Foodbank at All Saints Church, a Harvest themed afternoon in their mixed aged house groups and a STEM day. In addition to this, we are excited to have taken 15 ukuleles on loan until Christmas which the children in Year 3 will be learning to play. Alongside our 'wider opportunities' music lesson for the children in Year 4, this means that all the children in Class 3 will be learning a stringed instrument this term.

Wilberfoss CE Primary School

Wilberfoss supported Oscar's Paediatric Brain Tumour Charity throughout 2022/23, completing a range of fundraising events including Orange Day, cake sales and inflatable 5K races. They raised a whopping £3368.71, the most any school have ever raised for such a worthwhile charity that supports young people and their families through such a difficult time.


